The Houston Public Library Foundation faced unprecedented challenges during FY21 with COVID-19 but this did not deter from our commitment to support the programs and activities of the Houston Public Library. Just like millions of other non-profit organizations, we expanded our technological platforms, increased remote access to resources, and provided funding to the Houston Public Library so that they could continue providing access to their award-winning programs to the greater Houston community through virtual pathways. This included HPL's lending program of hot spots, laptops, tablets and other devices for individuals to gain connectivity. The cornerstone of our efforts in FY21 was toward bridging the technological divide.

With creative innovation that embraced the emerging needs of the Houston community, the Foundation shifted to a new standard of virtual operations. We embraced technology at every level of operations and programming. In FY21, we engaged our partners and donors through virtual platforms for all of our events. This involved rapid learning, which resulted in some trial and error, yet with patience and endurance, the Foundation emerged stronger and more resilient!

As of June 30, 2021 the Foundation held \$19 million for Library Programs, including the \$2.12 million corpus of the Foundation's endowments that is permanently restricted.








THE ASTROS FOUNDATION



The Barbara Bush Literacy Plaza at the Houston Public Library honors the incredible life and legacy of the former U.S. First Lady and serves as a focal point in Houston to inspire and instill a love for reading in all who visit. Renamed for Mrs. Barbara Bush in 2016, the beginning stages of the plaza kicked-off with private gift of \$500,000 from President George W. Bush and Mrs. Barbara Bush.



Dedicated in the fall of 2021, the beautifully transformed, versatile space features a water wall, an adult reading area, a children's reading room with shade structures, a performance stage, a jumbo video display screen for engaging programming and

artificial lawn, planters with trees, new furnishings, and other special amenities.

In collaboration with the Barbara Bush Houston Literacy Foundation, who has graciously donated over \$200,000, the plaza will also feature a bronze statue of First Lady Barbara Bush and 5 bronze metal benches in the shape of an open book that will be placed in the newly named "Barbara's Nook."

The Houston Public Library Foundation is grateful for the generous contributions of major donors - President George H.W. and First Lady Barbara Bush, the Brown Foundation, Inc., Downtown Redevelopment Authority (The Main Street/Market Square TIRZ #3), Phillips 66, and The Robert and Janice McNair Foundation who helped to make the Barbara Bush Literacy Plaza's opening possible.

The Foundation will kick-off the "Be A Part of The Plaza" Campaign in January 2022. This public campaign will be an opportunity for the public to make a contribution as a sponsor for pavers, lounge chairs, even a ping pong table and have them engraved to "be a part of the plaza."

Despite the several months that we had to shut down our warehouse because of COVID-19, the Friends of the Houston Public Library remained dedicated to our mission by volunteering to process and scan books culled from Houston Public Library branches and donated by the community. The Friends sell these books at our affordable monthly book sales bringing in tens of thousands of dollars each year to the Foundation.

In light of the pandemic, this past year we were only able to host three book sales. However, we have already kicked-off this new program year with our first book sale in October 2021 and anticipate hosting monthly book sales throughout this next year.

The Friends of the Houston Public Library is a coaliton of book lovers, professional altruists, education and literacy pioneers, big dreamers, goal-setters, and everyday Houstonians who band together to support and drive awarerness of the Houston Public Library.

Since 1953. The Friends of HPL have:

- Raised over \$2.5 million for hundreds of library programs
- Provided over 50 scholarships to the staff of The Houston Public
- Held over 100 community book
- Donated over 650,000 books back into our Houston community and









Houston Public Library

In March 2020 the Houston Public Libraries across the City closed due to COVID-19. Under the leadership of Dr. Rhea Brown Lawson, HPL Director, services and programming for the Houston community quickly shifted to virtual. The Houston Public Library began moving into virtual programming such as storytime via Facebook Live, curbside pick-up at most neighborhood libraries, and the HPL podcast, One Chapter.

During the summer of 2021, the Houston Public Library hosted the John P. McGovern Summer Reading Program. This reading program encourages kids and teens to read during the sizzling days of summer to elevate their reading skills in preparation for the next school year. They can participate by reading or listening to books then entering the book title's or time read on the online log. this program is graciously sponsored by the McGovern Foundation.

The Houston Public Library also hosted a digital version of Camp Stream, which is sponsored by the Powell Foundation. Camp Stream is a free, week long summer program that allows students in grades K-12 the opportunity to participate in activities relating to each aspect of STREAM: science, technology, reading, engineering, arts, and math.

The Foundation was honored to participate in three live virtual celebrations with HPL in January and February 2021.

For the highly anticipated reopening of the Houston Public Library (HPL) McCrane-Kashmere Neighborhood Library. The library located at 5411 Pardee Street reopened after sustaining damages from Hurricane Harvey and will offer limited services due to COVID-19. During post-Harvey reconstruction, the library facility underwent significant transformations and will feature updated finished, furniture, and community areas and expand access to technology and enhanced upgrade the McCrane-Kashmere Neighborhood Library resources.

HPLF is grateful to the Houston City Council for supporting the work and vision of HPL. Dr. Lawson shared, "As a cornerstone in the community, we are excited to reopen the McCrane-Kashmere Gardens Neighborhood Library to ensure residents have access to books and technology, resources that are critical, but even more so during the pandemic"

The Foundation was also proud to celebrate with the Houston Public Library the grand reopening of the Flores Neighborhood Library after it closed four years ago following heavy flooding and damages caused by Hurricane Harvey.

Mayor Sylvester Turner joined other dignitaries and community leaders at a virtual ribbon-cutting earlier today to mark the library's highly anticipated return.

For the foreseeable future, the Flores Neighborhood Library at 110 North Milby will offer limited public services in keeping with health and safety protocols during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Through a public and private collaboration that included a lead gift of \$1.6M donation to the Foundation from Aramco Americas, Houston Public Library opened the first new construction TECHLink concept. Located in the city's north side neighboorhood of Trinity Gardens, TechLink Dixon powered by Aramco, is on the site of the former Dixon Library that had been damaged beyond repair from Hurricane Harvey.

The facility, rebuilt in the same location at 8002 Hirsch Rd., bridges the technology divide with the latest interactive technology to enhance learning.

TECHLinks are multimedia and technology centers that are innoviative and transformative extensions of the library's services to provide communities with free and equitable access to new and emerging sate-of-the-art technologies.

Crafted as a learning environment with a focus on creativity, self-expression, and collaboration for increased service points to our customers in thier communities. Services provided at the TECHLinks are book, document, & photo scanners, VR heardsets, laser cutter and engraver, 3D printers and 3D Scanner, embroidery machine, kid-friendly handheld tablets, public workshops, music and video studio equimpment.
